IF YOU WERE GOD

A programme by Joe Katzman

Rabbi Aryeh Kaplan of blessed memory (American Orthodox Rabbi 1934-1983 who wrote about Kabbalah and Jewish Meditation) wrote a brief and excellent book called <u>If You Were God</u> (Mesorah, 1983). It begins with this provocative opening...

The Problem:

You are given an island where several tribes live. By nature and culture, these tribes are exploitative and belligerent. This results in much suffering on the island, caused by war, poverty and prejudice. They have been living this way for centuries without any sign of improvement.

Your Assignment:

- · To try to improve this society.
- To teach its members to live together in harmony and reduce suffering to a minimum or eliminate it entirely.
- To create a healthy society.

Your Resources:

- You have all the resources that a highly advanced technology can offer.
- You have the entire island under surveillance and can see what is happening in any place at any time.
- You have such devices as cloud-seeding equipment and can plant underground explosives. Within reason, you can control weather, flooding, volcanoes and earthquakes, and produce any "natural" phenomenon on cue.
- You also have devices that can be used to implant ideas through subliminal suggestion. You can implant ideas to entire populations or to certain select leaders.

However, you must take into account the severe limitations of subliminal suggestion. If you try to implant any ideas that go against the basic nature of the populace, they will be totally rejected and your efforts will be in vain.

One alternative would be to implant ideas that somehow would make use of the acknowledged bad nature of these people.

Your Restrictions:

Under no circumstances are the natives of this island to be aware of your presence. This supersedes all other considerations.

The cultural shock caused by your revealing yourself would disrupt the entire fabric of the island culture. It would cause much suffering and more than offset any good that you could possibly accomplish.

The natives would be reduced to a state of almost vegetablelike dependence from which they would be unlikely to recover. If they did recover, they might rebel so violently as to eliminate any positive values they might have originally had.

Therefore, the restrictions that you not reveal yourself must be followed without exception under any circumstances.

But aside from this restriction, you have a free hand to proceed as humanely or as ruthlessly as you see fit.

In short, you have the opportunity to play God.

What would you do?

THE GOLDEN RULE

as taught by Hillel:

"That which is despicable [hateful] to you, do not do to your fellow, this is the whole Torah, and the rest is commentary, go and learn it."

Babylonian Talmud, Shabbat 31a

Rabbi Hillel [born Babylon 1st Century BCE - died? Jerusalem, 1st Century CE] was one of the most influential scholars in Jewish history. Some of his sayings come down to us in the Mishnah called Pirke Avot, "Sayings of the Fathers."

WHO, WHAT AND WHERE IS GOD?

Examine the texts on the following three pages; they are intended as stimulus materials to help you explore who, what and where God is in your own experience.

Below are suggestions for different ways you might wish to approach the question:

- 1. Think about where and when you feel "closest to God," whatever that may mean for you. Then read the poem and listen to the song. Write a poem or paragraph or draw an image that represents your response to the material.
- 2. Go out into a local park and sit on the grass. Examine different blades of grass and spend some quiet meditative time individually. Then come together with another person and read the poem to each other. Talk about your thoughts and feelings, including where and if you think God fits into this.
- 3. After reading the poem, song and quotations with your class or a partner, imagine you are a blade of grass and write a poem, song or piece of prose expressing your identity and how you think you fit into the wide scheme of Creation.
- 4. Do you think God wants us to care about grass, and by extension, the environment? Talk, write or compose a song, poem or rap about your answer to the question.
- 5. Do some gardening work for an older or infirm person in your community. Get your hands dirty and feel the grass as you weed or mow.

QUOTATIONS ABOUT GOD AND NATURE THROUGH THE IMAGERY OF GRASS

"If the sight of the blue skies fills you with joy, if a blade of grass springing up in the fields has power to move you, if the simple things in nature have a message you understand, Rejoice, for your soul is alive."

Rabbi Nachman of Bratislav [a great Chasidic rabbi who was a master of mysticism] expressed this idea eloquently:

"Know that every single shepherd has a unique tune according to the grass growing in the place where he pastures his sheep. For every single animal has a special grass that it needs to eat ... and according to the grasses and the place where he pastures, so too he has a tune. For every blade of grass has a song that it sings, which is like a passage of poetry.

Rav Kook [Abraham Isaac Kook, first Ashkenazi chief rabbi of Israel and a great mystic and scholar] believed that when people make their lives fit in with nature then they can restore the sense of natural bliss, fine attributes and the experience of spiritual elation that they lost because of having grown apart from nature."

CONCLUSION

The conclusion is that there is no conclusion. We can never know the final answers to any questions about God, unless perhaps we learn them after our death in "the world to come."

In the meantime, we have our Jewish belief that we are created by God in the image of God, בְּצֶלֶם אֶלֹ הִים (b'tzelem elohim), and we therefore have the possibility of becoming and living the potential that God has created in us.

Imagine that every morning, as you dress for your day, you allow this thought into your awareness:

I am made in the image of God; I am part of the family of Israel and God is always with me, even at the darkest times. I can find within me the strength and creativity to be and do what God would like me to do, if only I can listen hard enough to hear that voice.

Just think what you might be and do.
